



This is a beautiful and magical story about a young girl who is raised by a witch in the woods. The girl must learn to use her powers to protect her friends and family from the evil that threatens them.



This is a heartwarming story about a gorilla who lives in a shopping mall. Ivan is a gentle and intelligent animal, but he longs for a life


outside of captivity. When a new elephant arrives at the mall, Ivan begins to question his own existence.

3. **Esperanza Rising** by Pam Muñoz Ryan



6. Wonder by R.J. Palacio



7. **The War That Saved My Life** by Kimberly Brubaker Bradley





This is a classic dystopian novel about a young boy who lives in a society where all emotions are controlled by the government. Jonas is


chosen to be the Receiver of Memories, and he must learn to keep the memories of the past alive.

10. **Holes** by Louis Sachar



11. **The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane** by Kate DiCamillo


This is a beautiful and magical story about a toy rabbit who travels the world. Edward Tulane must learn to love and be loved, and he eventually finds his way back to his original owner.

12. **The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian** by Sherman Alexie



13. **Freak the Mighty** by Rodman Philbrick



14. **Bridge to Terabithia** by Katherine Paterson


